Event: Exhibition of Satish Gujral's collection by Gujral

Foundation.

This month-long exposition will draw from the key artistic moments of the nine decades of Gujral's life and is a tribute to the zeitgeist of modernism as seen and portrayed by him. Over 70 original works of art will be juxtaposed with rare archival photographs spanning his life, and the remarkable people from the 20th century who touched his life, and vintage images of works that have long left public memory.

The protean talent and vast oeuvre of artist Satish Gujral mirrors the trials and tribulations of a fledgling nation. Gujral began his career in 1947 with dramatic paintings named the 'partition series' that captured and symbolized the trauma of the subcontinent's partition resulting in the creation of India and Pakistan. Crucially, memory as metaphor shadows his work, with characters appearing as leitmotifs across the many mediums he was to work with over the succeeding six decades: sketches to collages, abstract paintings to narrative depictions of the human condition. His work entered another epoch as he delved into sculpture in stone, metals and resin alongside elaborate forays into ceramics, a preferred material for his iconic murals across north India. This eventually led him to architecture, and his buildings have a distinct footprint derived from his quintessential style. In his working carrier of over 70 years Gujral is perhaps the only modern Indian artist to have dwelled into several diverse mediums and forged myraid paths. Today, his art has come full circle with newer works evocatively recalling earlier themes.

The lineage of the Garo people of Western Meghalaya goes back to Tibet. The Garo hills are interspersed with patches of low-lying plains bordering Assam and Bangladesh. The life of Garos revolves around the Sun God, who rules their *Jhum* or shifting cultivation, and envelops the dynamics of their life ways. The Wangla festival of the Garos is the time for celebrating the bounty and well being, bestowed by Sun God. It is the time to rejoice; time to choose the bride and the Groom; and the time for young persons to mingle freely. The films place the life and times of Garos in the background of their traditional philosophy and belief systems, and provides a mirror to the Garo mindscape.

It investigates the orality of the *Gharanas* and the broad punctuations of their renderings tracing the *Khayal* from the stand point of Amir Khusro who between 13th-14th centuries combined Persian airs with Indian *ragas*.
